GO TOUCH GRASS ... OR SAND

Welcome to Ontario's West Coast—your invitation to go touch grass in 2026. What began as a tongue-in-cheek phrase becomes something more meaningful here: a chance to step away from screens, slow down, and reconnect with what's real. In Huron County, that reset goes beyond nature—it's about feeling part of a place. It's found in simple moments: a chat at a farm stand, a tip from a shop owner, sharing a table, trail, or sunset.

Connection comes easily through local food, live theatre, and vibrant main streets.

Yes, there are sandy beaches and Lake Huron sunsets—but what stays with you is the feeling of belonging. Start here, follow your curiosity, and let Huron County welcome you.

BEACHES



Port Blake Day Park



Located at the north of Grand Bend, Port Blake Day Park offers a sandy beach with a bluff-top grassy picnic area with views of the spectacular Lake Huron sunsets. The park offers a picnic pavilion, washrooms, changing rooms, playground equipment, BBQs, and picnic tables. Dogs are allowed on the beach and must be leashed.

The park is open daily from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm from May 15 to October 12, 2026. The cost is \$30.00 per vehicle, flat daily rate payable by debit card only (no cash or credit cards). No buses or recreational vehicles (RV's) over 28 feet are permitted.



Point Farms Provincial Park



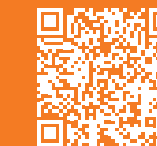
Once the site of a popular Victorian-era summer resort, the Point Farm Hotel, which operated from the mid-1800s until 1915, Point Farms Provincial Park has some of the finest beaches on Ontario's West Coast.

There is a beautiful, natural, sandy beach located north of the point and easily accessible from the Colborne Campground and beach parking lot. *Please note: there are no lifeguards posted at the beaches. Pets are only permitted in the designated area.*

The park offers many family-friendly experiences including 6 km of hiking trails, playgrounds and playing fields, washrooms, store, picnic areas, and RV, trailer and tent camping for longer stays. Day-use and camping fees apply.



Ashfield Park



Ashfield Park offers an escape from some of the busier beaches on the lakeshore. The 15-acre day use park is an ideal location to host a get-together or picnic in the park's pavilion and two universally accessible washrooms and a changeroom. To get to the public beach, just follow the winding road down from the park to a breath-taking secluded white sandy beach.

HIKING TRAILS



Goderich to Guelph Rail Trail



Stretching 132 km from the shores of Lake Huron in Goderich to the historic city of Guelph, the Goderich to Guelph Rail Trail (G2G Trail) offers a scenic journey through the heart of Ontario's West Coast. Built along a former railway corridor, this multi-use trail features crushed stone and short paved sections ideal for cycling, walking, running, and cross-country skiing.

In Huron County, the trail winds past open farmland, charming small towns, wooded areas, and picturesque bridges, providing a peaceful way to experience the region's agricultural landscape and rural heritage. Access points in communities like Blyth, Auburn, Goderich and Walton make it easy to explore a short stretch or plan a full-day adventure.

Maitland Trail



The Maitland Trail Association (MTA), a non-profit, volunteer-driven organization, was established on July 2, 1975, with the vision of creating a trail that follows the picturesque Maitland River. Today, their dedicated volunteers maintain over 80 km of marked hiking trails, offering hikers and nature enthusiasts the chance to explore the beauty of the Maitland River Valley.

The MTA maintains the following trails:

- Maitland Trail (including side trails)
- Millennium Trail
- Menesetung Trail
- Maitland Woods
- Sifto Loop
- Section of the G2G (Goderich to Guelph Rail Trail – from the Menesetung Bridge to Auburn)

The MTA also hosts the popular annual El Camino Maitland event each September.

South Huron Trails



The South Huron Trail is an 8 km, all-season trail that winds through the scenic Ausable River Valley. This accessible trail links MacNaughton Park in Exeter, and Morrison Dam Conservation Area.

Thanks to trail loops of different lengths (2 km, 4 km, or 8 km), you can spend 20 minutes or two hours enjoying nature. The Morrison Reservoir (Morrison Lake) is a human-made reservoir created by the construction of Morrison Dam in 1959 to provide a consistent water supply to a former canning factory in the town of Exeter.

Today, the area offers a unique ecosystem with many recreational opportunities. We invite you to explore Morrison Dam Conservation Area (MDCA) throughout the year and experience all its natural wonders!

COUNTY FOREST TRACTS

Robertson Tract – A Legacy of Woodlands

The Robertson brothers were passionate about reforestation. In 1936, they started planting trees on marginal farmland, making Robertson Tract one of the first plantations in the County. The brothers were so dedicated to the effort that they left their family farm to the County in 1947 as a legacy for future generations and a permanent natural buffer to the Maitland River.

A total of over 205,000 trees were planted on the property between 1936 and 1954. A Norway Spruce seed orchard was developed on several acres of the property resulting in millions of seedlings for the effort to plant 2 billion trees in Ontario up until the early 1990s.

The Maitland Trail goes through the Robertson Tract and follows the river's edge. A network of logging roads connect to the Maitland Trail and the level topography makes hiking and cycling easy. The property is a working forest, with selective harvest of trees occurring every 15 to 20 years.

Robertson Tract is located west of Auburn on Pinery Line.

Stevenson Tract – A River Runs Through It

Explore a piece of Ontario's reforestation legacy on the beautiful trails of the Stevenson Tract. Purchased by the County in 1951, this 200 acre property was part of a province-wide effort to reforest fragile lands for the improvement of water quality, reduction of flooding, and conservation of soil. Bisected by the Maitland River and the Sunshine Creek, the property offers fish and wildlife habitat alongside spectacular views.

West of the river, the Stevenson Tract features eskers which are long ridges of sand and gravel deposited by retreating glaciers. One of the trails runs along the top of an esker. Tree species on the property are predominantly Sugar Maple and White Pine.

For the 75th anniversary of the County forest program, a new interpretive trail was developed east of the river. This trail features a stone bridge over the Sunshine Creek.

The Stevenson Tract is located east of Brussels at the corner of Clyde Line and Morris Road.

Redmond Tract

The Redmond Tract is one of 14 forested properties owned and maintained by the County of Huron. The properties were originally part of the "Agreement Forest" program, a partnership between the province and local municipalities to re-establish forest cover on marginal land.

The partially forested Redmond property was purchased from Raymond Redmond in 1971, and over 47,000 additional trees were planted. A stream and two-acre pond are located on the east side of the property.

Featuring a mixture of upland Sugar Maple Forest and towering White Pines, the 150-acre property offers year round hiking along with seasonal snowshoeing, skiing and cycling. As a "working forest," the Redmond Tract provides sustainable harvests of wood products while providing fish and wildlife habitat and recreation.

Located north of the scenic village of Auburn, the Redmond Tract is just off the Donnybrook Line on Westfield Road.

Blyth Festival



Since 1975, the Blyth Festival Theatre has put all Canadians and certainly rural Canadians centre stage — telling our stories, sharing our history, and celebrating our way of life.

The Blyth Festival remains true to its original mandate: *To produce and present the best in Canadian storytelling*. The Blyth Festival has premiered 156 (and counting) new Canadian plays. All of these are plays written by Canadians, directed by Canadians, designed by Canadians, and performed by Canadians. All of them are fully-realized professional productions about life in rural Canada.

Enjoy summer performances in the cool and comfort of Blyth Memorial Community Hall, a 373-seat theatre, originally built by the community to commemorate the young men lost in World War One. Or take in the country setting at The Harvest Stage, a permanent open-air, fully accessible amphitheatre, with a thrust stage and audience on three sides. It's an intimate venue with open skies above.



Huron Country Playhouse



The Huron Country Playhouse offers audiences a dynamic mix of Broadway-style musicals, hit comedies, intimate dramas, musical revues, and family-friendly productions across its Mainstage and South Huron Stage, delivering professional live theatre experiences throughout the season.


Located in a country setting on the sparkling shores of Lake Huron, and next door to Dark Horse Estate Winery, the Huron Country Playhouse is the perfect spot to experience summer theatre. There are 650 seats in the mainstage auditorium and 300 seats in the South Huron Stage auditorium.

Part of Drayton Entertainment, a charitable organization has grown from a fledgling theatre in the village of Drayton, Ontario into a national phenomenon in Canadian theatre to include seven theatres operating in five unique communities. Each theatre maintains its distinct identity, but at the same time combines the strengths and energy of all to provide an entertainment experience that is unparalleled.

HERITAGE



Huron County Museum

 The Huron County Museum is home to historical and cultural exhibitions, both temporary and permanent with a mission to engage our community in preserving, sharing, and fostering Huron County culture. Thousands of artifacts illustrate the history of both our rural and urban communities in a variety of themes and topics.

The Huron County Museum has been welcoming visitors and exhibiting the stories of Huron County since 1951. Join us in 2026 as we celebrate our 75th anniversary! It started as the dream of one man, Joseph Herbert Neill, to collect the items that he felt told the stories of the settlement of Huron County and continues to this day. As our collections continue to grow so do the stories that we can discover!

Permanent exhibitions feature early settlement, agriculture, industry, military, and main street galleries including a full-size steam locomotive central to the building. A variety of temporary exhibitions throughout the year investigate and explore topics of local significance.


The Huron County Archives cares for the archival collection at the Huron County Museum which can be accessed by the public for research purposes.

The Huron County Museum typically offers a variety of events, activities and exhibits throughout the year to welcome the public through our doors and we endeavour to tell the stories of Huron County in a variety of methods on-site, off-site and online.



Huron Historic Gaol National Historic Site

Opens May 15, 2026

 The Huron Historic Gaol is a unique octagonal building which served as the County jail from its opening in 1841 until closure in 1972. At the time of construction, it was viewed as a model of humanitarian prison design. Originally the building served as Gaol for the Counties of Huron, Bruce, and Perth but after the counties separated the building served only the County of Huron for the majority of years.

Throughout its history the Gaol housed inmates registered for crimes from misdemeanors to criminal convictions, including three men who were hanged for crimes of murder. It also provided shelter as the House of Refuge for the ill, destitute and mentally ill. Men, women and children all spent time in the Gaol throughout its history, with

thousands of names and situations in the Gaol register.

The Gaol is now a National Historic Site visited by thousands of people each year. Visitors are welcomed daily to climb the central staircase, explore the cellblocks and learn the real stories of the people who spent time behind bars. While onsite visitors can also visit the Governor's House, built in 1911, as the home for the Gaoler and his family.

Special events throughout the summer months also allow extended opportunities to explore the Gaol and encounter the stories of past in-mates within the walls.

Meet some of our artists



Brad Turner

What inspired you to become an artist?

Growing up in Bayfield my mom was a teacher and dad was a mechanic. I bought my first 35mm Pentax camera when I was 15. Capturing local people and places fueled my passion and shaped me as a film director and photographer.

What mediums do you work in, and what draws you to them?

I have always liked working in black and white for my personal street photography. I mainly shoot on film, but I also like monochromatic cameras and digital infrared.

How would you describe your artistic style or the themes you explore in your work?

I always seek simplicity in my shots by finding unique composition and point of view. This allows me to photograph people and places that I hope inspire people to explore the story behind the subject.

How does Huron County's landscape, people, or way of life influence your art?

Having worked all over the globe, I find that Huron County is the place that fills my soul. I feel fortunate that I have been able to capture the immanence of Bayfield and preserve memories of growing up in a small lakeside community.



3 Pines Sunset

Brigitte Wolf

What inspired you to become an artist?

My work is rooted in an understanding of the past. She has studied traditional stained glass and knows that the transmission of light is the essential function. Her work probes the mysterious process by which light is transformed into ideas and emotions.

What mediums do you work in, and what draws you to them?

I have been working in stained glass for over 40 years. My work is primarily flat glass, intended for private and public spaces, enhanced with sandblasting and glass painting.

How would you describe your artistic style or the themes you explore in your work?

Always, in my work, there has been a desire to balance a traditional visual vocabulary with a modern sensibility.

How does Huron County's landscape, people, or way of life influence your art?

Life along Lake Huron offers a constant dialogue between water and land, shaping both the imagery and colours of my art. Supported by a thriving local creative scene, I value the chance to participate in the galleries and cultural events that make this region a haven for artists.

Elizabeth Van den Broeck

What inspired you to become an artist?

Art was always my thing from the very beginning. All through school I was the kid who was constantly drawing — especially horses — and my parents were incredibly supportive. I just knew this was what I was meant to do. There was never anything else I wanted more.

The challenging part was figuring out how to build a life around it. Finding a way to support myself through my art took time and creativity. Opening my gallery and offering art related services like custom framing and printing made it possible. It gave me both the materials and the outlet I needed to keep exploring, creating, and growing as an artist.

What mediums do you work in, and what draws you to them?

I work in a range of mediums, but my primary focus is oil paint, especially on paper. I'm drawn to oil because of its extended drying time, giving me the freedom to blend, adjust, and build a wide range of colours without losing vibrancy. Oils also dry to the colour I intend, unlike acrylics, which tend to darken, so I can work with a level of precision and subtlety that really suits my process.

I also love working in soft pastels for many of the same reasons. They offer pure, immediate colour and let me play with composition and tone in a very intuitive way. Both mediums give me the ability to explore colour deeply and let the image evolve naturally as I work.

How would you describe your artistic style or the themes you explore in your work?

My paintings are mostly contemporary impressionist, defined by bold spaces and heightened, non-literal colour. I often begin by laying down strong underlying colour and then painting the negative spaces first, allowing the image to emerge naturally from the background. This approach creates a distinctive separation between my strokes and colour fields, giving the work a structured yet expressive feel. My love for the outdoors draws me time and time again to landscapes and I use my work to help me broaden my knowledge of my surrounding environment.



Reverence

How does Huron County's landscape, people, or way of life influence your art?

Huron County is my home and my heart, and it's the landscape, trees, and native fauna of this place that inspire my work almost exclusively. When people say there's no place like home, I feel that deeply; the fields, riverbanks, and woodlots around me are the foundation of my artistic language.

In my current body of work, I'm drawing my reference points even closer. I've become increasingly interested in the role of native flowers and trees in our local ecology, and how understanding them can shift our perception of beauty. Invasive species surround us, and learning to identify and mitigate them has changed the way I see the land. At the same time, discovering and celebrating native plants, and the ways they support insect life, has become a joyful part of my process.

Paintings that honour these small ecological "wins," like Joe Pye Weed thriving along the riverbank, make me genuinely happy. They allow me to celebrate the resilience and quiet importance of the natural world right outside my door.

Farm Little



At Farm Little, they do a lot... They raise and process their own meat, their own flour, and bake their own bread, and source the best local products around!

Their little store is jam-packed with organic/pastured/local meats, stoneground flours, organic pantry staples (dried fruits, nuts, seeds, rice, baking ingredients), organic produce, dairy, and so much more.

What inspired you to start farming or producing food here?

We noticed a lack of quality, organic food available in Huron County. That, and the fact that we both wanted to be able to make a living while being home with our kids.

What is one product from your farm that visitors should try?

Our top sellers would definitely be our house-made sausages, red fife flour, and dried mangoes.

What's one thing about farming or producing food that most people would be surprised to learn?

Although the lifestyle isn't one that we'd trade for anything; it's not a walk in the park. We don't get to take days off regardless of weather, sickness, or any other curveball that life throws at us.

What is your favourite season on the farm, and why?

Spring, 100%! Everything comes to life, the sun shines more, and we can go outside without taking 20 minutes to get everyone's outerwear on!



Hayter's Farm



The Hayter's Story: A family-owned turkey farm in Dashwood, Ontario is the place where three generations of the Hayter family have devoted their passion for premium quality turkey. From the whole bird to many delicious turkey products they're yours to enjoy.

What inspired you to start farming or producing food here?

Harry Hayter began raising turkeys on our family farm in Dashwood. Since 1948, second and third generation have continued his passion for raising turkeys.

What is one product from your farm that visitors should try?

There are nearly 50 turkey products available for all seasons and occasions. From turkey steaks, fillets, burgers and sausage for the grill. Or smoked ready-to-eat products from the deli. Or oven ready products - turkey lasagne, chili, meatloaf and roasts.

What's one thing about farming or producing food that most people would be surprised to learn?

We are the only family-run turkey operation in Canada that produces turkey from poult to plate.

Turkey is all we do - from raising the turkeys to processing, packaging, and shipping across Canada - all from our family farm.

We also offer our turkey products from our farm retail outlet.

Grazing Meadows Wagyu



Tim and Donna Prior live just east of Brussels and own and operate Grazing Meadows Wagyu. Through innovative grazing practices on their 100-acre farm, they specialize in raising high quality Wagyu beef cattle for human consumption and breeding stock.

What inspired you to start farming or producing food here?

Being a town lad and marrying a farm girl landed us on a farm in Huron County with great soil and growing conditions to start our journey to grow great food here.

What is one product from your farm that visitors should try?

One product to try for sure is our Wagyu jerky. Super amazing. Quite frankly, though, all our cuts of

wagyu meat are so scrumptious. Simply a mouth-watering eating experience.

What's one thing about farming or producing food that most people would be surprised to learn?

We are open to show and teach our consumer how our meat is raised and cared for. As food producers we are here to educate and show off our operation.

What is your favourite season on the farm, and why?

Spring is our favorite season for sure. All the calves are born at that time of year, and all the plants, trees, and wildlife start their growth and new beginnings in the spring.

Meeting Place Organic Farm



Nestled in the rolling hills of northern Huron County, Meeting Place Organic Farm is stewarded by the McQuail family; currently three generations living together on the farm, shepherding the farm's goals

of sustainability. They build community, regenerate the environment, and raise happy, healthy animals. The primary work on the farm is raising certified organic, grass-fed and finished beef animals; pastured pigs, pastured meat chickens and laying hens (eggs); growing organic apples, and cut flowers, and hosting community events.

What inspired you to start farming or producing food here?

Tony and Fran emigrated to Canada in the early 1970's, and were drawn to the rolling hills as they reminded them of home. Always concerned about the human impact on the world around them, and passionate about animals, organic and regenerative farming was an obvious direction to take. They started using draft horses, raising dairy goats and sheep. In 2014, Katrina moved home to start the farm succession, and take over the farm and business. She was pulled back to the farm with fond memories of growing up there, and more recent experience of being so happy when she worked on the farm for her summers. Now Katrina and Ben are raising their three small children on the farm, while continuing the family legacy.

What is one product from your farm that visitors should try?

That's hard to narrow down. Everything is so delicious. The easiest one to transport and that is accessible to everyone would be our apple butter. Made from our certified organic apples, still growing on the trees that were on the farm when we first got the farm. Our Northern Spys are what give it the special tang which make most people fall in love with it. It has no added sugar, is vegan, and is great on crackers, sandwiches, as a marinade for pork chops, added to BBQ sauce or used in baking!

What's one thing about farming or producing food that most people would be surprised to learn?

I think it is really easy for people to romanticize farming or producing food. To think about all the great moments, (of which there are many), being

with baby animals, growing little seedlings and planting them out. And, it is super unsexy. There is all of the business side of it; traceability paperwork, government paperwork, paying bills, invoicing customers, responding to emails, etc., etc., etc., and then there is the working outside in all weather

What is your favourite season on the farm, and why?

Just one season!? I love them all for different reasons. Autumn is when everything is ripe and beautiful. We've got our flower gardens in full bloom and production, the apples are being harvested, we've put up our hay, the animals are still rotationally grazing on the pastures, we're eating vegetables from our gardens, and the light is just beautiful. People are back from summer holidays and starting to gather for events again, so we're also hosting and building community.

Spring is my favourite because of all the baby animals. Our calves are being born, we're getting our day old chicks, bunnies and goat kids. We're hatching out ducklings and the sows are farrowing their litters of piglets. It's such a magical, if messy, time. It is also when we are planting so many seeds to get ready for our own growing, but also to sell as seedlings at our Mother's Day Farm Open House and Seedling Sale. It's the time of year that feels full of potential and rebirth!

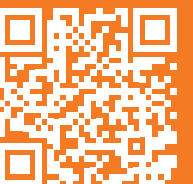

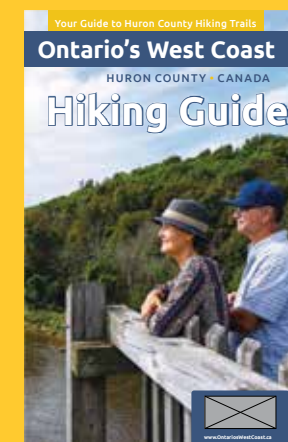

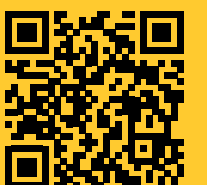
